

Mine Clearance Begins in Olovo, BiH!

Last April, MLI partnered with the Mine Detection Dog Center in BiH and held the first Mine Awareness Night to Make a Difference (MANMADE) Dinner in Sarajevo, BiH. Raising more than \$100,000, the event had strong support from the American Chamber of Commerce in Sarajevo and the United States Embassy in Bosnia Herzegovina, as well as dozens of businesses, governments, and other caring individuals. The funds raised that evening are being used to clear mine fields, deliver Mine Risk Education and help landmine survivors in Bosnia. With the support of the U.S. State Department's Office of Weapons Removal and Abatement, which generously matched funds raised during the MANMADE Dinner, the mine-contaminated land around the town of Olovo, BiH is being cleared.

We are thrilled to share with our supporters that the mine-clearance project began last week in Olovo, where two of our MDDs - MDD Charlie and MDD Granite - are working to "sniff out" landmines and save lives in that area. Tragically, just a few weeks before the work in Olovo began, a six year old boy was killed by a landmine as he was gathering firewood with his father. This highlights the importance of the work being done and MLI would like to once again thank the generous sponsors of the MANMADE Dinner, who MDD Charlie is sniffing made this US State possible. Because of the success of that evening, and with the help of MDDs Granite and Charlie (sponsored by the schoolchildren of Kingston, NH and Pfizer), the children and parents in Olovo will no longer have to fear these deadly weapons of war.

Survivors' Assistance Program in Lebanon a Success!

This summer, MLI partnered with the American Task Force for Lebanon (ATFL), the Lebanon Mine Action Center, and the Landmine Resource Center at the University of Balamand to launch a comprehensive program to assist landmine survivors. With funding from the U.S. Department of State's Office of Weapons Removal and Abatement and generous ATFL private donors, this highly successful program is providing critically needed medical care, prostheses, vision care, and vocational training courses to 90 landmine survivors from the Bekaa Valley, Mount Lebanon, and the South of Lebanon.

Thirty of the survivors, ranging in age from 22 to 73 years old, were identified as needing prostheses and other medical care. The vocational training is being provided to 60 of the survivors and their family members, and includes computer training classes to improve their skills, enabling them to become more competitive in the job market. The training includes a 12-session course that focuses on

basic computer program functions and internet usage. Survivors range in age from 14 to 52 years old. Upon graduation from the computer training course, the survivors will be presented with certificates of completion.

Four Mine Detection Dogs Arrive in Iraq!

Two weeks ago, after completing their first phase of training at the Global Training Academy (GTA) in Texas, four new MLI Mine Detection Dogs (MDDs) arrived in Iraq to be paired with their Iraqi handlers at the Iraqi Mine Clearance Organization (IMCO). Accompanied by two experienced trainers from GTA, the dogs have now begun the next phase of their training with their handlers, preparing for their work in Central and Southern Iraq where they will "sniff out" mines and save lives.

The MDDs were generously sponsored by children in the Model U.N. (MUNSA) program in San Antonio, Texas, the Parkinson family, and the U.S. Department of State's Office of Weapons Removal and Abatement.

Hope for the Future: Akhter Mohammed

Afghanistan has been devastated by fighting and wars for many decades, which has left much of the country littered with landmines, unexploded ordnance, and other weapons that lie in wait for the unsuspecting foot of an innocent man, woman, or child. Over the past several years, the Marshall Legacy Institute (MLI) has provided 28 Mine Detection Dogs to "sniff out" the landmines in Afghanistan, while also helping hundreds of landmine survivors providina medical bv assistance and vocational training.

One of the young landmine survivors that MLI has been working with for the past several months is Akhter Mohammad, who was tragically injured when he was just 11 years old. In 2007, Akhter was playing with his classmates outside of

their school in the Rohi Doaab District of the Samangan Province when they discovered an anti-tank landmine and a smaller anti-personnel mine. Not realizing the danger, Akhter and his friends began playing with the mines, with tragic results. The explosion that took place killed two of Akhter's friends and left him with a seriously injured leg and missing his left hand.

After the explosion, Akhter lay bleeding for nearly an hour before his uncle found him and carried him home. With no hospitals or clinics in the area, Akhter spent the next few weeks in agony as he recovered in his family home. The pain in his leg continued to worsen and the family worried that the infection would spread throughout his body, so the uncle made the difficult decision to amputate Akhter's left leg in order to save his life.

Despite the devastating circumstances, Akhter was determined to return to school

and get an education. His family could not afford a prosthetic leg to help him walk, so the next five years were a struggle, but Akhter persevered and is now in the 9th grade.

MLI's Children Against Mines Program (CHAMPS) has been raising money to help Akhter since March 2012, when we first learned of his tragic story. Over the past few months, Akhter has been using one of MLI's computer centers in Afghanistan, improving his computer skills and learning English. Thanks to the support of caring people like you, we recently were able to provide young Akhter with a prosthetic leg, enabling him to walk for the first time in five years! Thank you for your generous support of the Marshall Legacy Institute as we work to promote hope, growth, and stability in war-torn countries like Afghanistan.
